Glory to Jesus Christ!

→ Have you ever thought about what it means to **be with God**? Where is this path to Paradise with God?

Our life is a **journey to Salvation**, and can be described as a ladder, where our daily experiences and struggles represent steps which can bring us closer to God.

Life is a Journey

This image of a ladder was taught by **Saint John Climacus**, a 7th century spiritual father of the Church, known for his writings encouraging the faithful to live according to God's commandments.

How often do we help others? How often do we read scripture outside of liturgy? Do others see the Image of God in our words and actions?

Drawing Closer to God

Why should we do what the Church teaches? Because, as St. John reminds us, what we do today either separates us from or **brings us closer to God**.

We become real members of the Orthodox Church - and our true selves - when we say "no" to the passions and temptations of life, and say "yes" to doing what Christ teaches.

Living on the Ladder

As Orthodox Christians **our experience of God** must extend beyond standing at liturgy on Sunday morning. It means actively offering our praise and thanksgiving for God's mercy, and then **sharing that same mercy** with friends and strangers alike.

Making God's Kingdom present in our world begins with **receiving the Eucharist** and then going into the world **bearing the Light of Christ** in school, at home, and every place we go.

Now is the Time for Action

Pascha is just a few weeks away. These days of **Great Lent allow us to repent** and draw closer to God. Deciding to focus on God means our prayers, fasting, and acts of charity **bring us closer to God**.

As we ascend the ladder of our life, our acts of holiness make us like the saints who resembled the Image of God before others. May we also draw closer to God and each other, thereby **bringing Paradise into this world**.

Climb the Ladder to Heaven

Over 1400 years ago a monk named John was living in Egypt and was asked to write a guidebook to help other monk with their spiritual efforts.

Saint John wrote a book called *The Ladder of Divine Ascent*. It helps everyone know how to draw closer to God through godly acts of charity and prayer.

Saint John uses the image of Jacob's Ladder (read Genesis 28:10–19) to teach us about the temptations we'll face and how to focus on God.

The goal is to do things which will unite us to the love and joy of God.

Anger


